

Update: Medicaid Expansion in Virginia



On January 1, 2019, Medicaid became available to eligible adult Virginians who live in households earning **less than 138 percent of the Federal Poverty Level**. In 2020, those levels are \$17,609 annually for an individual or \$29,974 annually for a family of three. [Click here for information.](#)

Medicaid expansion has been a great thing for many patients; a recent [study published](#) in Health Affairs found that Medicaid expansion improved people's health. At the one-year mark for Medicaid expansion in Virginia, the number of newly enrolled adults in Medicaid nearly doubled from 200,100 to 370,000. And survey data from [an online dashboard](#) recently released by the Virginia Department of Medical Assistance Services indicates that **before gaining health coverage from Medicaid, nearly two-thirds of enrollees went without needed medical care**, primarily due to costs.

While Medicaid coverage is comprehensive – including physician, hospital and emergency services, prescription drugs, behavioral health and substance use services - below-cost reimbursement rates cause a shortage of services in some areas of care. Additionally, there are **some patients who fall through the cracks and can't get the services they so desperately need**. Some may lose coverage throughout the year, whether it's because they get a raise and go over the income limit or because they fail to renew coverage when due. **We continue to learn that access to insurance doesn't always mean access to care.**

Access Now remains a vital lifeline for those whom we serve. **Even with Medicaid expansion in Virginia in 2019, Access Now served more than 2,000 patients in Central Virginia** who needed specialty care. Medicaid expansion has allowed all of our primary care partner clinics to expand outreach to additional uninsured patients. While some left Access Now because they are now insured with Medicaid, we added **1,098** new uninsured patients last year.

The Virginia Health Care Foundation's latest [Profile of the Uninsured](#) offers an in-depth analysis of the state's uninsured population. Key findings include:



- 10.3% of Virginians under age 65 are without medical insurance – equaling 719,000 uninsured Virginians.
- 12.5% of Virginians ages 19 to 64 years of age had no health insurance — 630,000 non-

elderly adult Virginians.

· Most uninsured Virginians are part of working families (3%) — more than nearly two-thirds (65.4%) with at least one full time worker.
